From the GM:

Another school year is upon us. We hope that all employees enjoyed the summer months and we want to welcome the great group of new employees to the beginning of the school year. Our staff has been working around the clock in preparation for the new year. Our non-stop efforts have put us in a great position as our driver board appears to be full or will be full in just a few weeks. This is a remarkable feat. We have recruited and trained more new employees than we ever have in our company's eighty-one-year history. This colossal feat did not happen by chance. Beginning

this school year, Beach Transportation has increased our hourly wage to all employees substantially. Our drivers and attendants did an outstanding job in recruiting employ-

ees over the summer. Thank you so much. With the generous help of the school districts that we serve, Beach Transportation is able to offer a onetime \$500 *"thank you/retention bonus"* for all the returning employees that work through the month of September. The "thank you" is for the folks that worked through the pandemic. We are so proud of everyone for your devoted perseverance.

I would like to discuss the pandemic for a bit as we begin the school year. As of today, most of the restrictions that we were following have been lifted. With that, much of the safety protocol that we were asked to follow is still very beneficial to us on a daily basis. Let's continue to keep our windows down as air recirculation is very important for disinfecting. Beach Transportation is not required to disinfect buses everyday but continue to disinfect your bus with the bottle disinfectant at least once per day. It will kill all of those flu viruses that your riders may leave on your bus. Keep your hands washed and use hand sanitizer when you can. Do not be discouraged about wearing a mask. Lastly, get a flu shot as prescribed by the CDC each year. Do the very best that you can to protect yourself and others. At the beginning of each school year, I stress the "Mandatory Driver Greeting". You will find a yellow card in your mailbox that covers this info thoroughly. This is

essential to begin your year. Notice the word "Mandatory". Your introduction to your riders and covering all of the school bus rules allows us to begin the discipline process with

all students. Each year, the most difficult time that we have with discipline is from those drivers that ignore this simple process. They find that the students get further and further unruly. These drivers eventually get frustrated and want the problem fixed immediately. In all cases, the driver has not even


introduced themselves to their students, hasn't gone over the safety rules of the bus or doesn't know the name of one student on their bus. Make sure that you catch Tracie's safety meeting that covers school bus discipline. It is based on years of experience and information that will work for you.

You will see an added safety feature on your school bus. It is an "extended stop arm". This is a four-foot extending bar from your stop sign that is lit to get approaching motorists' attention. I want to emphasize that this extended stop arm does not teach students how to cross the road safely. This is our responsibility. Be diligent when you teach your students to cross the road safely. Assist every rider everyday with a safe signal. Personally, I always inform students that are departing the bus if there is an approaching car or a car behind the bus. This gets your students attention. This is vital to the safety of all your riders and let's get them trained early in the school year. Lastly, lets get to know our students from day one. You need to know who your Kindergarten students are. Remember, all "K" riders need to be met at the bus stop by a responsible person. We cannot allow a "K" student off the bus alone. You do not need to be your student's best friend but with a little effort, you will get to know the names of your riders. This will help you gain the re-

spect of your riders. We are wishing everyone a safe and happy school year. Please take the time to attend Tracie's monthly safety meetings. They are very informative. Let's take the time to meet our fellow employees. The strict pandemic restrictions have lifted and it is time to become a family again. Thank you and be safe.

Employee Profile: John Shivley

John Shivley was born and raised between Missoula and Stevensville. He has many fond memories of growing up on two boys John and David. Seven years into the marriage a farm and being spoiled by his mother and sisters. He was born premature at only 4 lbs and 10 oz. His three older sisters took turns taking care of him until they all moved out. He was nine years younger than his youngest sister so most of his life he was basically an only child and got spoiled. His family lived on an 80 acre ranch in Florence. They had horses and cows he says "I even had my own cows, I was pretty rich for a five year old." After his sisters moved out his folks bought a dairy farm in Stevensville.

He had a few very memorable experiences falling in the hay

barn. He'll never forget the day he jumped out of the hayloft without looking like he always did. That day his dad had moved the hay and he found the hard ground instead. Another memorable moment, he was helping his dad throw some bales down and didn't quite get his hand out of the twine and went down with the bale. By age ten his mom started getting sick and the doctor thought it was allergies to the hay so they sold everything except the horses and moved to town.

Missoula proved to be a place to

get into trouble for John. The little country boy was not impressed with riding his horse in the tiny block sized pasture, so he would sneak out with his horse. After a month his dad caught him. The friends John made in town only got him into trouble so his parents would go down to Florence and pick up his best friend, Tom Yelton.

John and Tom have been best friends since they were in 1st grade. Their friendship has survived thousands of miles, decades of time and a few BB gun shots to John's "tooshie." About the only time John wasn't in trouble in Missoula was with Tom. They would save Wonder Bread wrappers to go to the movies and have fun with their BB guns.

After a year in Missoula his family moved back down the Bitterroot. His dad kept him busy breaking horses. He also had sheep, chickens and lots of farm chores to keep him busy and out of trouble. "I loved it" he says.

When he was a freshman in high school his mom was diagnosed with cancer. His family took the loss very hard. He struggled for a while until he found football. His principal told him he may not graduate so the "bull headed stubborn Irishman" managed to graduate with a 4.0 and burned off all his steam on the football field.

After high school he became involved in rodeo, Saddleback Bareback riding. It was a lot of fun but he didn't come home with very much money. He decided to try Saddle Bronc riding, but at the first rodeo, the cinch broke and he was sent flying. Somehow he didn't break a bone and decided he needed to find something that didn't beat him up. After the rodeo he moved over to Minnesota where he had family. He was very successful at being a delivery driver.

While there he met the mother of his children. They had they found they didn't want the same things in life so they went their separate ways.

He moved back to Missoula, then over to Washington for a traveling job. He was a door to door sales man for Action Heating and Soot Eaters a furnace cleaning and chimney sweep company. His route covered part of Washington, Oregon, and Wyoming. He had a lot of return customers and always stood by his promises. He even got pretty good at the furnace cleaning and replacing blower motors himself when the work wasn't up to the expectation of the customer. He really enjoyed the job but the sales area he had to cover was so big he didn't have a chance to make a home other than a hotel.

He had an opportunity to work for a carnival in Southern California. He ran the roller coaster for two days until he got an amazing surprise. He was told to finish his current line of people and then shut the ride down. At first he was concerned and then here came Selena, the Grammy winning singer. He gave her a "real good ride tilting it pretty hard in the corners." She asked for a second ride. She performed that night and she pointed right at me and said my name, I still don't know how she got my name but she said if you want a ride go see him he will give you the best ride." In 1995 he moved home to be closer to his dad, and started looking for a job. He walked in the door at Beach and Harold Keyser recognized him immediately. He asked if John was looking for a job, he said yes and Harold said "you're hired now fill out an application." He drove bus 112, the CS Porter route up Miller Creek and Hayes Creek. Shortly after he moved back to Missoula his dad had a stroke and passed away a few months later. Bob Beach not only told him to take all the time he needed he had flowers sent to the funeral. John remembers how proud of him his dad was for helping kids get to school. He didn't want to leave, but without a check during the summer he had to find more work.

He worked at a few in-state trucking companies over the next few years until he couldn't stand being out of town anymore. Walmart was the last job before he retired Retirement worked out for a while. Tom and Paul Yelton started working at Beach and John decided he wanted to come back. Even after every place he's been and everything

he's done he says his life has really just started. Last school year John and Amber started spending time together. On June 21st they tied the knot! John says "This angel starts talking to me and then she proposed to me. She makes my life complete."





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
