weeks of school, it's crucial to address complacency and route hypnosis to ensure the safety of passengers and other road users. To combat these tendencies, here are some strategies:

<u>Self-assessment</u>: Regularly evaluate your driving habits and skills. Be honest about any signs of complacency you may notice, such as lazy eyes, reduced scanning, or following distances becoming too close.

<u>Stay alert:</u> Keep your eyes moving and scan the road ahead and to the sides for potential hazards. Maintaining awareness of your surroundings helps prevent accidents.

<u>Maintain safe following distances</u>: Ensure there's enough space between your vehicle and others, giving you ample time to react to unexpected situations.



<u>Engage with your route</u>: Stay actively involved in your driving by thinking about the specifics of

each stop, including which students get off, when to activate lights, and any other relevant details. This keeps your mind engaged and reduces the risk of distraction.



### **Employee Profile: Bryan Larson**

One day while refereeing high school basketball with Bob Mitchell, Bryan was pitched the idea of driving buses. He was working at the Bonner mill at the time but thought "let's give it a shot!" which was how we scored a win with Bryan joining Beach Transportation.

On and off over the past 25 years, Bryan has been with Beach Transportation as other work allowed. When the mill closed, he landed some work at Valley Electric and then ended up at Platt Electric for about 10 years. He is currently a Correction Officer at the jail. During his current career, he worked with adults for two-and-half years and is now working on the juvenile side. Bryan expressed "I really enjoy working with the juvenile side at the jail. With my experience over the years with kids, both in refereeing sports and driving bus, it has been a rewarding fit. Whenever I am parting ways with someone after their time in jail, I always think the highest compliment they can give me is to never see them here again. I see lots of folks outside around town after and get to say hello and sometimes hear a "thank you" from them. It is really rewarding."



Bryan was born and raised in Missoula. He went to grade school at Emma Dickinson school which is now known as the Lifelong Learning Center. He continued schooling over at Rattlesnake Elementary from fifth through eighth grade and graduated from Hellgate high school. During high school, Bryan played base-

ball for the Missoula Mavericks & Missoula Reds and football as well. He tried his hand at basketball, but "after my freshman year, I knew I wasn't in my coaches plans so I stuck with the other two sports".

His school and those surrounding him were super supportive, especially through the rough times. He recalls how during his high school years, his younger sister was passing and the community really came together to help his family out. "The grade school my sister was at, Hellgate high school where I was, and Beach Transportation were all there for us. Bob Beach had sent over her own bus when she was able to go to school and was feeling well. It's a time I will never forget because of how amazing people were".

Growing up in Missoula, some of Bryan's favorite stomping grounds were Skate Haven roller rink and cruising the drag. "In high school, your weekends were cruising the drag down Higgins and that was big back then!" Lots of weekends also consisted of family camping trips with other families and their church. Speaking of church, Bryan is still

heavily involved with his faith. In his younger days, he would attend the First Assembly of God and still so as an adult at the River of Life out in East Missoula.

Outside of work, Bryan likes to "chase the grandkids" and keep up with all things family. With seven grandkids spread out in Montana and two in Germany, it keeps him quite busy. Bryan's youngest son got married and joined the army during the pandemic and was placed in Germany. During their time there, their family grew with two kids and worldly connections to go with it! With the oldest son (teacher and basketball coach in Wolfpoint) and youngest daughter (working for the state in Helena) life and family keeps him busy!

When Bryan isn't working, he likes to do some hiking, get outdoors, and will try his hand at bicycling this summer. Remaining active seems to be a trend as Bryan has ran 8 half marathon courses in the past including the Rock N' Rock Marathon in Vegas and ran the Missoula Marathon in 2017. This year he aims to complete the Missoula Half Marathon.

We spoke to Bryan about his goals and hopes in one of our favorite topics- retirement! Travel is high up on that list. Norway to be specific. Bryan's grandparents were from Norway but he has never been. In these travel goals, Bryan expressed the desire to tie these trips with his other passion for sports. "I would like to go see some different old ball parks like in Boston or Chicago". Another top priority would to be present with family and staying involved whether it be a grandkid's concert at school or traveling with them.

Sports have played an integral role in Bryan's life. From sports movies like *Forty Two* and *Blind Side* to actually playing and refereeing them. Refereeing sports made a name of Bryan -and a nickname- where fellow referees coined him Stumpy and it still sticks today. He was a MOA (Montana High School Association) member officiating basketball for 35 years, working 15 boys and seven girls state basketball tournaments throughout his career. Outside of the MOA, he additionally officiated American Legion base-

ball for 40 years, spent 10 years as an umpire fill in for the Missoula Osprey pro baseball team and had 20 years' experience officiating basketball at the NAIA level. In 2023, the MOA announced Bryan will be inducted into the MOA Hall of Fame and his plaque will be placed over at Hellgate high school.





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
