For the next few months, most of our school bus routes will begin and end in darkness. Driving in low-light conditions presents unique challenges that require extra attention and adjustments behind the wheel.

Reduced visibility affects depth perception, color recognition, and the ability to spot hazards early making reaction time even more critical when transporting students.



**LET YOUR EYES ADJUST.** Our eyes need time to adapt to darkness. When entering your bus in low-light conditions, allow a few minutes for your eyes to adjust before pulling out. Keep dashboard lights dim to reduce glare inside the cab. If interior lights must be used, give your eyes time to readjust before driving.

**MANAGE GLARE.** Oncoming headlights can temporarily impair vision. Avoid looking directly at bright lights and instead focus on the right-hand edge line of the roadway to maintain lane position. If glare comes from behind, adjust your mirrors or use the night setting when available.

**KEEP VISABILITY CLEAR.** Clean windshields, mirrors, and lights are essential for nighttime safety. Dirt or film can intensify glare and significantly reduce visibility. Even a light layer of grime on headlights can greatly reduce illumination. Make sure windshield washer fluid is at least half full and all lights are clean and working properly.

**SLOW DOWN AND INCREASE SPACE.** Never outdrive your headlights, you should always be able to stop within the distance you can see. Reduced light means hazards may appear suddenly. Increasing your following distance gives you extra time to react and adds a vital safety cushion.



**SAFETY FIRST.** Driving a school bus in the dark requires heightened awareness. Slow down, scan continuously for students and pedestrians, and anticipate the actions of other drivers. Adjust for conditions, stay patient, and remember that arriving safely is always more important than staying on schedule.



Driving in the dark can be a challenge but by letting your eyes adjust, controlling glare, maintaining clear visibility, and allowing extra time and space, you help ensure safe travel for every student—no matter the lighting conditions.



# Employee Profile: Adam Vylasek

If there's one thing Adam would tell you about himself, it's this: he's a simple guy who likes to stay busy, try new things, and keep life moving forward. But once you dig a little deeper, you'll find a whole mix of interests—from football and classic cars to Eagle Scout adventures and aviation scanners.

Adam was born in Havre, Montana, where winters are cold, windy, and not exactly forgiving. After moving around the state with his family—including stops in Miles City and Great Falls—he eventually landed in Missoula, which he's called home ever since. He attended Sentinel High School, largely because it was close to home (and back when school boundaries were a little more flexible than they are now). During his time there, he participated in football as well as shotput and disc.

After high school, Adam jumped straight into the workforce. "Work, work, and more work," he jokes. He held several jobs before starting with U-Haul around 2017, and shortly after that, he joined our team in 2018. Adam came on board at Beach looking for something new—and that's exactly what he found. One of his big motivators was earning his CDL Class B and gaining hands-on experience in a field where solid jobs can be hard to come by.

Since starting, Adam has trained with several team members, including Wayne, Jerry, and Tracie, picking up

knowledge wherever he could. He's the kind of person who's willing to jump in, stay productive, and help wherever needed. For Adam, staying busy beats being bored any day.

He also keeps up with the Griz, usually listening or watching from home when work allows.

Adam has a strong appreciation for older vehicles. While Adam isn't big on heavy bodywork, he enjoys helping out with cleanup and maintenance and hopes to learn more

over time. That love for history and classics shows up in other ways, too. It's no surprise that his movie taste leans toward action-packed classics and historical settings. Favorites include *Fast & Furious*, *Pirates of the Caribbean* (the old ships are a big win), westerns, and the occasional paranormal or ghost investigation show—especially the "live" ones that make you think twice.

One of Adam's proudest achievements is earning the rank of Eagle Scout before turning 18. His Eagle Scout project involved planning and supervising the installation of a kiosk at Rock Creek Campground. While he couldn't physically build everything himself, he handled the planning, coordination, and oversight—skills that still come in handy today. Through scouting, Adam learned practical life skills, went camping often, traveled to Canada, and even tackled nighttime obstacle courses. These days, he camps less than he used to, but the gear is still at home—just in case.

Adam keeps things simple in the kitchen. He's not a big cook, but he can handle the classics: tacos, pizza, burgers—no complaints there. In his downtime, Adam likes to relax, listen to music, and keep tabs on what's happening locally. He's especially interested in aviation and owns a handheld scanner that lets him listen to air traffic and local activity. Music-wise, he enjoys a little bit of everything, with a soft spot for hits from the 1990s and early 2000s—plus some newer artists mixed in.

When it comes to the future, Adam keeps his expectations realistic. "Get rich," he laughs—but mostly, he wants to keep gaining experience, try new job opportunities, and see where life takes him. He's open to moving someday, as long as the climate is right and the job makes sense. He hopes to gain the chance to take to the skies himself with a pilot's license—including his own official scanner in the skies.

At the end of the day, Adam believes nothing lasts forever—and that's why learning, working hard, and staying open to new opportunities matters most.
